Play to kick off program year Meeting to be held at Jefferson Sept. 9

"Fanny Kemble at the Slave Plantation," a one-woman play that examines the rights of women in the first half of the

19th century, will be performed at the September open meeting of the Erie Branch of the American Association of University Women.

Performed by Lydia Axelrod and produced by Ron Flucker, the program is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Monday, Sept. 9, at the Jefferson Educational Society. The program is free and open to the public. Members are encouraged to bring guests.

The 40-minute production to be presented is an edited version of "Shame on the Devil," a

production created by author and actress Anne Ludlam in 1980.

"Fanny Kemble at the Slave Plantation" illustrates famous British actress and author Fanny Kemble's reaction to the conditions faced by enslaved people in the 1880's using facts gleaned from a journal Kemble kept after her marriage to a wealthy Georgia plantation owner and grandson of a U.S. senator. The monograph examines the rights of women at the time and provides a description of slave treatment on the plantation.

"Fanny Kemble at the Slave Plantation" re-creates a scene wherein Kemble addresses an audience in a New England town with a thriving textile industry.

Axelrod, a professionally trained actress and motivational speaker, received her doctorate from Columbia University in school administration and has taught English and drama at the high school and college levels. Flucker, the producer, was trained as a structural engineer but derives great pleasure from his "side gig" of writing and producing presentations.

The famous (infamous?) triangle (student-teacher-parent) seems to be unraveling, and public schools are caught between retaining students to get funding vs. losing their authority over how best to educate them. More specifically, the

PA state budget passed with no funding set aside for vouchers – for now. One might think that a Democratic governor would not even entertain a voucher system at taxpayer expense, but the State House is split, hence politics weighed heavily, until public pushback allowed him to sideline the funding.

But there is more... Not a day passes by that some of us hear something about school curricula being tampered with or books being banned, not by the curriculum directors or librarians who are trained professionals but by self-described groups calling for long lists of topics and books to be stricken from the curriculum... School boards yield as they are elected officials, not professional educators. Then there is the counter movement pushing against equity and diversity in schools.

These are hefty issues, and one often feels overwhelmed and is tempted not to get involved. However, we are university educated women and mostly of the generation that will turn over a world bereft with these issues to the younger women soon... We don't have the luxury of complacency.

My way of dealing with this is to start at the local extensions of at least one or two of these topics, seek out those who think alike or are willing to debate in a civil manner and go from there. I invite you to do the same if you aren't already...

Take note of the webinars the State or National AAUW sends out on these or other topics close to you, sign up and just click to join the podcast. You don't have to have an opinion or speak up...
